SPRING NEWSLETTER 2005

What's happening on your allotment this spring?

FEBRUARY

- o Cultivate and cover empty beds with cloches or clear polythene to prepare for early sowings.
- o Sow carrots, parsnips, early beetroot and bulb onions under cloches.
- o Plant out garlic and shallots on light soils and make outdoor sowings of broad beans and summer cabbage. Delay planting on heavy soils until the soil starts to warm up.
- o Set potato tubers to chit (produce shoots) as soon as they arrive. Stand upright with rose end (with most shoots) upwards in a light, cool but frost-free place. Old egg boxes make excellent holders.
- o Net crops to reduce pigeon damage to cabbages.
- o Check ties on cane, cordon and fan fruit - replace ties that are broken or damaged.
- o Place cloches

MARCH

- o Chit early and maincrop potatoes. Earlies can be planted out in the second half of the month if mild..
- o Sowing starts in earnest for most vegetable crops.
- o Plant onion sets. Raise leeks for transplanting in June.
- o Divide overcrowded perennial herbs.
- o Put supports in place for peas.
- o Plant strawberry runners. Sow cabbages

APRIL

- o Control the weeds!
- o In the second half of the month sow marrows, courgettes, pumpkins and squash in a glasshouse or the windowsill and dwarf French beans and sweet corn under cloches.
- o Thin sowings in rows as soon as seedlings can be handled.
- o Sow a seedbed of brassicas to provide transplants of sprouts, cauliflowers and cabbages for planting out in June/July.

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of the Hackney Allotment Society held on Thursday 7th October 2004 at St Mary's Church Hall, Defoe Road.

Present: Joss Bany, Jackie Breakwell (Treasurer), Sue Carling (Secretary), Mary Connolly, Jon Fuller (President and Chair for Meeting) Edward Couyet, Sarah Kissack, June Lancaster, Peter Logan (Chair), Sarah Mott, Mairin Power, Mary Roberts, Maggie Wilkinson (Minutes), (Committee Members) and approx. 30 other members.

Apologies: Gene Feder

Jon Fuller welcomed the members.

Minutes of the previous meeting 1/20/03:

Noted: 2 spelling mistakes in names; otherwise the minutes were agreed.

Matters arising: There were no matters arising.

Chairperson's Report – Peter Logan

Main site issues: there had been major tree work at **Aden Terrace** – also some thefts and vandalism. All was well at **Church Walk**. **Leaside** had shown great improvements having begun the year in a mess; there were now two site reps and a good deal of clearing had taken place, though illegal dumping had continued. At **Overbury Street** clumps of pyrocantha had been cleared and the site was generally well managed. **Queensbridge:** rubble had been removed from outside; there was still no water and negotiations continued with developers to try to provide it. Problem with a dead tree needed resolving. **St Kilda:** large poplar in neighbour's garden reducing light and ploholders were trying to identify owner. Some rubble there too. **Springdale Road:** long awaited repairs on adjacent house had finished successfully with little disruption. A tree needed attention there too. There had been hawthorn hedging planted at **Springhill** to reinforce the boundary; problem of rubbish dumped by ploholders had been resolved.

Spring Lane had seen break-ins and tools stolen but as gate had been left unlocked this was not surprising. New shelving in shed but shed itself will need attention before long. Both fencing and paving would need money and work. There had been an encouraging site meeting and communal work done on creating a sitting area.

Generally it had been a good growing year after some encouragement to some ploholders. Members were reminded that subletting was not permitted outside the household.

Production of the Newsletter had been patchy with editor difficulties. A website would be an alternative in the future and certainly sending out the newsletter by email would save money and time. All members urged to assist in this by providing email address.

There had been no opportunity to provide events for those on the Waiting List, now over 100, apart from a fairly well attended Open Day of plots in August. Plans of all sites had now been completed thanks to Joss Bany and only needed some clarification over numbering.

The Council had taken back from Nelson Bakewell the task of landlord agent. Negotiations continued and the Committee were stressing the importance of allotment use to be enshrined in rental agreements.

Comments on the Chair's Report:

The Leaside dumping had now been stopped and had recently been cleared
The rent had been paid up and we were not in debt.

Soil Testing. This topic took up the major part of the meeting and as each plot holder has received correspondence since the meeting, here is a summary.

The Secretary and Chairman outlined the background: A law passed in 2000 gave the Council a duty to test soil in areas of recreation. Accordingly the allotments had been tested in May/June, and after initial results given at a committee meeting in July, further tests had been made. The Committee had then been called to an urgent meeting with Pollution Control, whose opinion was that there was contamination of lead and arsenic higher than recommended levels on all sites except Overbury Street and St Kilda's, with Aden Terrace and Queensbridge most seriously affected. A full report had been provided on the afternoon of the AGM and the Society was told that the Council would be writing with advice to ploholders and an invitation to a meeting as well as a phone number for queries.

A wide-ranging discussion followed with the following points made and questions raised:

- Further advice should be sought from the London Hazard Centre
- It was hoped to get a re-test on Aden Terrace and the testing of crops as well as soil had been suggested, as had happened in other boroughs
- There were several variables likely to affect the take up of contamination
- Remediation may involve replacement of top soil to a depth of half a meter with a membrane laid down before new soil was brought in
- DEFRA funding would be sought by the Council to do this
- Soil had been tested when the Society was first set up and the results had been satisfactory – we should try to get these results from the Council
- Leaside soil had been replaced when the site first opened and Spring Lane was tested in 1998 – since then standards had changed
- In context, crops would need to be eaten regularly for many years for any serious affect and more danger came from eating or otherwise ingesting the soil
- Several members expressed anxiety that this was a precursor to the Council taking over sites for development; the Committee assured members they had and would continue to express this fear but the Planning Officer had denied any such intention. However it remained a worry and it was vital to get the use specified in the rental contracts.
- Growing Communities had already undergone testing and remediation.
- Development of a website would be useful for assisting information to members
- There should be research into alternatives to replacing soil, what the levels were in other parts of London and into which vegetables were most in danger.
- Any remediation the Society could provide might be used as a negotiating factor
- In a show of hands it was clear that the vast majority of members intended to continue eating their crops as before.

Treasurer's Report – Jackie Breakwell

Our expenditure had been greater than our income chiefly because of tree work at Aden Terrace. Three estimates had been provided and the cheapest one used. Church Walk was so far the only site with a water meter. Since the accounts had been done the rent had been settled with the Council.

Questions to the Treasurer: none.

Election of Officers and Committee Members

Peter Logan was retiring as Chairperson and was thanked by the membership. Maggie Wilkinson was elected as Chairperson.

Sarah Mott was elected as Vice-Chairperson.

Sue Carling was re-elected as Secretary.

Jackie Breakwell was re-elected as Treasurer.

Sarah Mott agreed to do the Newsletter as well as being Vice-Chair.

In the absence of any volunteers to do the minutes it was agreed that committee members would rotate in the duty. (However this is not easy for the Secretary or Chair)

It was explained that in the past a site had become organic following voting by site members. It was tricky to legislate over other members. To ask new members to adhere to organic methods would require a change in the bye laws – this would involve registering a motion of the next AGM with good notice, publicized in the invitation to the AGM. The meeting, while generally supporting organic gardening, was divided between those who supported a change in the rules and those who were uncertain as to how such a rule might be policed and preferred a mission statement to a rule change.
